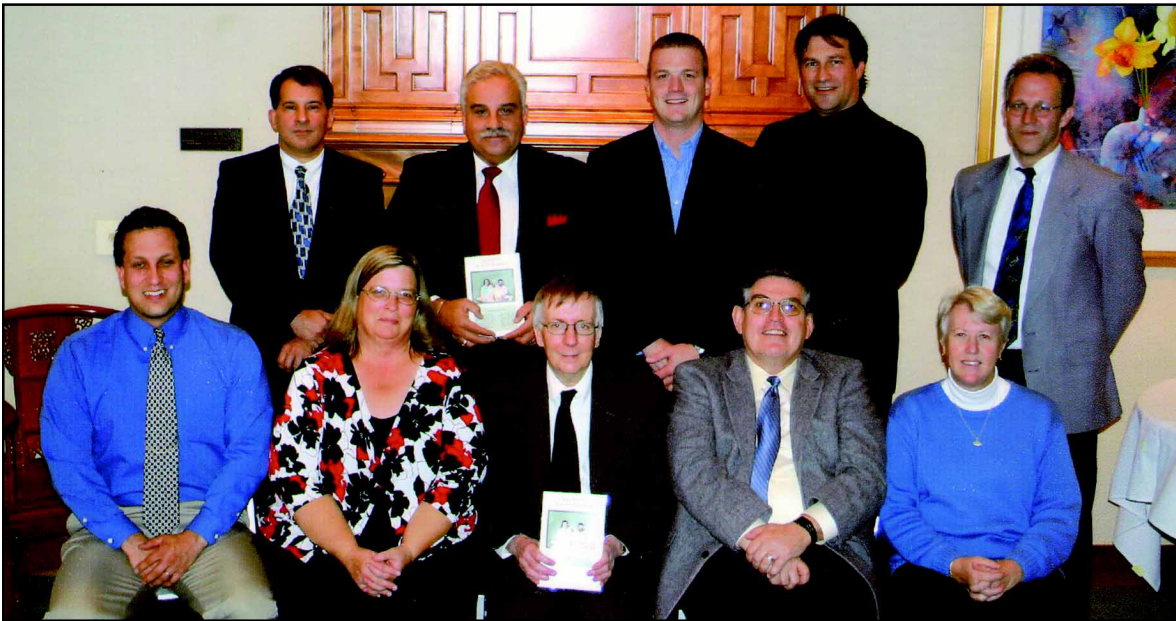

The 170-page book of essays, *Children's Health Problems*, is available free to the members of the King's College community. Dr. Bernard J. Healey, Chairperson of the Health Care Administration and International Business program, recently wrote the book while recently on sabbatical leave.

He was assisted in this project by several community leaders in the Wilkes-

Barre area. Contributors to the volume include Drs. Christopher Alexander, Fevzi Akinci, Thomas Ross, and others. The book was edited by Cheryl O'Hara.

The essays deal with such topics as tobacco use by children, diabetes, obesity in children, preventing high risk health behaviors, juvenile arthritis, and eye problems in children.

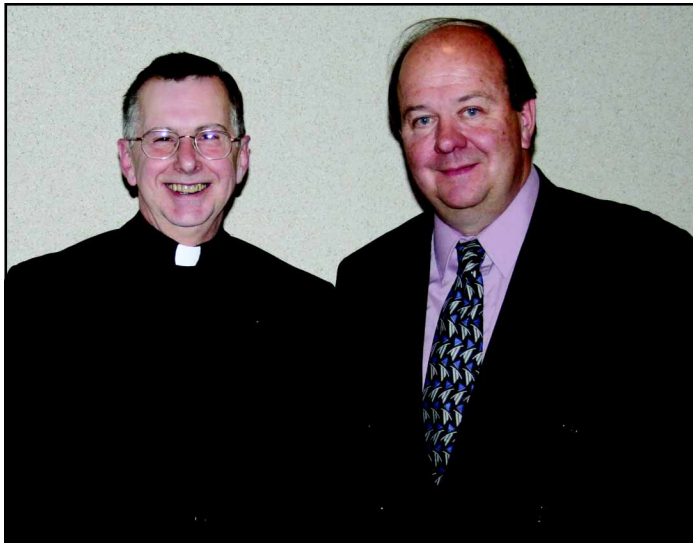

Dr. William Irwin, associate professor of philosophy, and his philosophy series were featured in a review in the Chronicle of Higher Education's "The Chronicle Review," entitled "And Have You Been a Good Little Epistemologist" by Carlin Romano.
